David L. Hoover is Professor of English at New York University, where he teaches in the areas of digital humanities, stylistics, Chaucer, and Science Fiction. He has been doing humanities computing/digital humanities for more than thirty years, and now works mainly in the areas of corpus stylistics, computational stylistics, and authorship attribution. He has just published *Digital Literary Studies: Corpus Approaches to Poetry, Prose, and Drama* (with Jonathan Culpeper and Kieran O'Halloran). London: Routledge, and is currently working on a book on how modes of composition (handwriting, dictation, typing, word processing) affect authorial style.
