I find your letter fascinating and challenging. Whereas the dreams of mathematics are not independent, in my view, I now see why law is such a difficult subject: its dreams are conflicting. To the extent one is recognized, another is deprived of vitality.

Here is my list: doubtless no two lawyers would agree:

1. The dream of justice.

(Neutral principles applied in an even-handed way without regard to parties.)

2. The dream of equity.

(Decisions based on all of the particular facts of the case which, although not adhering strictly to rules, satisfy some higher sense of justice.)

3. The dream of compassion.

(The allowance of an extra measure of grace reflecting a recognition of human frailty.)

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4. The dream of efficiency.

(The proscriptions of the law effectively
